March 11 Prayer Meetings

On March 11 (Wed) there was a moment of prayer at 14:46 at each of the churches. There were also services held in the evening for mourning and prayer. We helped by handing out prayer cards that the Local Aid Committee made, listening to the testimony of those that were affected by the disaster, by inviting the local community to the services, and by discussing about what occurred during the disaster with the people that attended.

Hoping for the Independence of the Disaster Victims Sendai Assembly

The night of March 11, 4 years from the disaster, there was an assembly titled “March 11 Evening of Mourning and Meditation” at Japan Baptist Sendai Christian Church in Sendai city, Aoba ward.

An executive committee made up of pastors and schoolteachers hosted the assembly. About 70 people from the community participated.

Two citizens of Ishinomaki city that were victims of the disaster spoke of the current situation in the disaster stricken areas



and the hurdles it must face for reconstruction. The manager of a whale specialist store in Ayukawahama Ishinomaki city, Miss Izumi Ichiko (64), who’s home was swept away by the tsunami, expressed her hopes that the hearts of those that were devastated could recover as soon as possible, and gain its independence.

20 candles were lit along with a performance of the marimba, as the participants held a moment of silence and prayer for the victims.

Pastor Ogawa Yoshinobu (59), the executive director said, “Even 4 years after the disaster, there are still those that continue to be disadvantaged by the disaster. They are unable to plan their future. True reconstruction is impossible without turning our hearts to people like this.”

“Northeast Japan is doing well, but that does not mean that it can be discarded.” These were words from the “3.11 special edition” collaborate broadcasting by Fukushima Private Broadcasting, Kahoku Broadcasting, and Iwate Daily Broadcasting. The rate of reconstruction is varied but there are still those that are living in desperate conditions, cities with declining populations, cities that have been divided, land that is yet to be decontaminated. These sorts of realities still exist in Tohoku. There are even areas where the residential development is said to take up another 2 years.
