Though I cannot remember from when, but for some time now, when we visit, we are treated with a meal and a warm greeting of “welcome home”.

Currently, the whole of Otsuchi-cho is surrounded by enormous landfills. Trucks, cranes and tanks run through the narrow, maze like streets. I felt as though my heart could not keep up with the changes. I felt left behind. I have heard similar things from the people living in the temporary housings in the area.

Hearing this, I wondered if there wasn’t any way to support the everyday lives of the residents. I decided to hand out the rolls of wool that had been donated to us from through out Japan. These were then wonderfully

transformed in to cute fluffy bird and cat decorations, handkerchief cases and warm wool hats. Lately, these have started being sold in church and university bazaars. The money raised from this has been used as for goodbye hot-springs gifts to those that leave the temporary housings. This is such delightful news.

The other day there was a magnitude 5 earthquake. I phoned the residents at the temporary housing straight away. I was told, “We’re fine. We’re fine. We are going to have tea time all day today at the common room because the people living alone must feel lonely.” It is wonderful to see how the common room space, which was doubled thanks to the donations, is being used. When I heard this I thanked the lord for allowing us to make the common room into a bigger space. Life here will probably continue like this for some time. I want to visit Otsuchi-cho again. This is the feeling I have as I write this report.
